New Castle Career Center and Ivy Tech CDL Program

New Castle Career Center and Ivy Tech are partnering to offer students a new Transportation Pathway. Students will earn 6 credit hours during their senior year to prepare, learn safety, and take the CDL A or B certifications. The majority of this course will be hands-on learning. During the second semester, the students will have the opportunity to work in the transportation industry 4 days each week. The curriculum will be continued on one class day during the second semester. There will be a 6 students maximum enrollment.

Potential Applicants

- Seniors who are 18 by Monday, August 21, 2023
- Passed a drug screen by Monday, August 21, 2023
- Held a driver's license for at least one year

- Classes will be held at the New Castle Ivy Tech
- The driving portion will be at the Muncie Ivy Tech on Cowan Road

Class Logistics

- The students will be eligible to take CDL A and B after the first semester and participate in work-based learning during the second semester

Common Job Titles for CDL-A Operators Include:

- Truck Driver
- Line Haul Driver
- Log Truck Driver
- Over the Road Driver (OTR Driver)
- Production Truck Driver
- Semi Truck Driver
- Tractor Trailer Operator
- Tow Truck Driver

If you hold a CDL-A, you are also authorized to operate any vehicle that requires a CDL-B license. This allows you to operate a wider variety of commercial vehicles and has broader career opportunities, which can potentially increase your earning potential.

A CDL-B Commercial License is Required for the Following Vehicles:

- Limosine
- Transit Bus
- Cement Truck
- School Bus
- Dump Truck
- Boom Truck
- Garbage Truck

If your job only requires one of these vehicles, you may not need to earn your CDL-A. The types of CDL-B driving jobs may be ideal for those who want to work in a more limited geographical area (stay close to home) or if trucking is not a long-term career path.
